The green heron is a relatively small and stocky bird that is found in swamps, creeks and streams, marshes, ponds and other wetlands over much of North America. Its coloring is a glossy, greenish-black and it has short yellow legs. The green heron is one of the few birds that use bait to attract fish by dropping twigs or insects into the water. It announces its presence with a loud and sudden squawking call. The green heron is a roaming bird, abandoning its straintories after breeding season to move around the region.

for life and can live more than 20 years. Egg-laying takes place as early as December or as late as August for non-migratory populations, and begins in early April and late May for migratory groups. Mesting usually takes place next to wetlands in nests built from nearby plants. Chicks reach independence around nine to 10 months old and begin forming their own breeding pairs between the ages of two and seven years old. Sandhill cranes are known for the dancing skills during courting.

The great horned owl can be found from tropical rainforests to suburban backyards, living in the Arctic and all the way to South America. It is one of the most widespread and common owls in North America. Great horned owls subsist on a diet of mostly small mammals, including rabbits, rodents, so well as reptiles and other birds. The great horned owl is also known to eat skunks. Female great horned owls are slightly larger than their male counterparts, though males have a deeper, lower-pitched call than the females. The owls are mostly recognizable by their size and their feather ear tutts. They live, on average, between five and 15 years in the wild.
